From the Desk of the Pastor

"I will praise you, Lord, for you have rescued me."



We continue our celebration of Easter with another gospel account of a post-resurrection encounter of Jesus and his disciples. Instead of finding spirit-filled disciples going out to the ends of the earth, we find the disciples going back to their former ways of life after the Lord had died and rose from the dead and even appeared to them.

Even Peter, the head of the apostles, decides to throw in the towel on the whole discipleship living and go back to his old way of life. He says, "I am going fishing." Upon hearing this, other disciples follow him. The scene suggests that the disciples were unable to sustain their Easter faith. Yet, we hear Jesus standing on the shore waiting for them after an unsuccessful fishing trip. Instead of chastising them for abandoning their mission, Jesus greets them with such tenderness and calls them children. Then he guides them with some fishing pointers, which leads to such a miraculous catch of fish that they finally recognize Him as the risen Lord. We can very much relate as the Lord's modern-day disciples. How easy it is for all of us to go back to former ways of life after making changes in our lives, especially when it comes to our spiritual lives. However, just as the Lord was so gracious on the seashore, he is just as gracious to us today. When we find ourselves "out at sea" — discouraged by our failures or for squandering the gifts God has given us, or simply by a lack of progress in our faith life, Jesus is with us! He is calling to us to himself from the shore to come back to him without shame or embarrassment, but with hope-filled trust in his steadfast love. He never tires of offering "do-overs" if we just keep returning to



GOD'S OVERFLOWING KINDNESS

The superabundance of God's kindness ties all of today's readings together. Especially when life overwhelms us, the Lord provides all we need, and then some. In the Acts of the Apostles, Peter takes the lead when facing the Sanhedrin. We might expect the man who denied Jesus to crumble under the imposing glare of the high priest. Instead, the Holy Spirit helps him testify to his faith in Jesus Christ. What Peter had lacked before, courage and conviction, God provides in abundance. Similarly, today's Gospel shows Jesus providing a surplus of fish for the disciples. They have no luck fishing until the Lord intercedes. Jesus supplies an almost ridiculous number of fish, and he cooks it for them, too. As our reading from Revelation affirms, the overflowing riches of God require constant praise. Countless creatures—"everything in the universe"—cry out to honor the Lord, forever and ever.

Stewardship Moment

This weekend's Gospel reading from John enjoys a number of themes not least of which has to do with hearing Christ's call to live differently but returning to

our "comfort zones." Even after seeing the risen Lord and receiving his blessing and missionary charge, his disciples go back to what they were doing before Jesus first called them. Instead of continuing Jesus' ministry, they return to the life they knew. When faced with the choice between embarking on a new way of life or staying where life is familiar and comfortable, they chose the latter. Good stewards know that Christ has called them to open their hearts and live in a different way. How often do we

retreat from the Lord's call so that we may remain with what is comfortable and familiar?

Family Connection

Today's Gospel describes what we can easily imagine as a picnic on the beach. Just as Jesus' miracle at the wedding feast at Cana blesses the love between man and woman celebrated in the sacrament of marriage, Jesus' attentiveness to food and mealtimes raises the possibility that our meal gatherings can be sacred times. In families, the domestic church, our meals together are everyday opportunities to gather and recall Jesus' presence with us. As in the Eucharist, we bring the gifts that God has given us, which have been prepared especially for our Mass, and at our family meals we share gifts that God has given to us and that we have worked together to prepare. This includes the food on the table and also the people who gather around the table. We ask God to bless these gifts and to be present among us in all of our interactions.

Consider a recent family meal: What food was served? Where did the food come from? Who prepared the food? Who served the food? Was mealtime a happy time? Why or why not? Observe that today's Gospel tells about a meal that Jesus shared with his disciples after his Resurrection. Read aloud today's Gospel, John 21:1-14. Reflect on the Gospel reading using the questions above. Talk about ways in which this meal that Jesus shared with his disciples might remind us of the meal we share at the Eucharist. You might choose to plan a special meal together as a family, encouraging each person to participate in the meal preparation. Pray together that Jesus will make his loving presence known in your family life. Pray together the Lord's Prayer.


service to others and generous giving.







Morning prayer to be filled with God's joy

If we want to experience God's joy in this life, we should pray for it every morning.

Often what happens in the morning will set the tone for the rest of the day. For example, if we start in a grumpy mood, we will likely carry that approach into everything we do.


This is why it is important to begin each day asking for the help we need from God.

Let the knowledge of You grow in me here, and there [in heaven] be made complete; let Your love grow in me here and there be made complete, so that here my joy may be great in hope, and there be complete in reality. Amen.

Is swearing a sin?

Swearing, or using bad language, is mentioned numerous times in the Bible and is explained as a sin in the Catechism of the Catholic Church.

In today's popular culture, swearing, or using bad language, is extremely common. At first glance, it doesn't appear to be a sin, as it doesn't always hurt someone.

Technically speaking, the use of profanity is not in the Catechism of the Catholic Church, but it does fall under a few different categories.

Using the Lord's name in vain

First of all, whenever someone uses the Lord's name in their swearing, it is a direct violation of the second commandment.

The second commandment forbids the abuse of God's name, i.e., every improper use of the names of God, Jesus Christ, but also of the Virgin Mary and all the saints. (CCC 2146)

This is probably the most obvious way that swearing can be a sin, as it does not treat God's name with respect.

Calling other people names

The next way that swearing can be a sin is by calling other people vulgar names.

 $\ensuremath{\mathsf{God}}$ calls each one by name. Everyone's name is sacred.

The name is the icon of the person. It demands respect as a sign of the dignity

of the one who bears it. (CCC 2158)

Calling someone a profane name is another clear example of how a person can violate the second commandment.

Foul language in general

After the above examples, there is more gray area, as the Church doesn't specifically list every single curse word in the Catechism.

However, the Bible does repeatedly stress the need to avoid all "foul language."

But now you must put them all away: anger, fury, malice, slander, and obscene language out of your mouths. Colossians 3:8

It is not what enters one's mouth that defiles that person; but what comes out of the mouth is what defiles one. Matthew 15:11

As with all sin, a person must know that it is a sin and say these words with full consent. Sometimes we may let one slip, and this isn't always easy to stop.

The key is to try and let our language lift other people up, instead of bringing them down.

Reflect

"Accept the Risen Jesus into your life. Even if you have been far away, take a small step towards Him: He awaits you with open arms." – Pope Francis

"Surprise!" We often hear this word at events/parties, from a baby shower event to a birthday party. Most people love surprises. The reaction is usually unexpected and the person(s) is in a "shock" state of mind.

Today's Gospel is the infamous "Road to Emmaus" story. Jesus reveals himself again to his disciples, this time at the Sea of Tiberias. He catches them by surprise (yet again) as he helps them catch fish and has breakfast with them. The gospel continues on to a conversation between Jesus & Peter. Jesus presents the question to Peter, "Do you love me?" Not just once, but three times. The Gospel ends with the simple instructions from Jesus - "Follow me."

Let's celebrate the love, joy, peace, and happiness of Easter! Jesus suffered, died, and rose from the dead - all of us! We should rejoice and be glad
