From the Desk of the Pastor

""Lord, send out your spirit, and renew the face of the earth."

Our Easter season culminates with the glorious feast of Pentecost. We can imagine how incredible that moment was for the apostles and all who witnessed it. The Holy Spirit was alive and working.

The Holy Spirit is just as alive and willing to work here and now in our day-to-day moments as back at our first Pentecost.

Our First Reading bears witness to the first Pentecost. During this encounter with the Holy Spirit, the apostles and Mary felt a driving wind, there were tongues of fire on the heads of each of them and the Spirit allowed them to speak in different tongues proclaiming acts of God.

We might hear this reading and wish the Holy Spirit worked that obviously in our lives each day. The truth is, the work of the Holy Spirit in our lives is obvious — we just might be blind to it, or it might be that we have closed ourselves off to the Holy Spirit's wonderous works.

Our tongues of fire might be a profound conversation with a friend, something that you needed to hear in that exact moment, or even a closed door to an opportunity for something much, much greater. These are movements of the Holy Spirit in our everyday moments.

The more we take time to recognize them, the more we become aware of them.

On this Pentecost Sunday, let us give thanks to God for sending us His Holy Spirit. And let us strive to be in tune with the Holy Spirit by looking for the ways God has been working in our lives.

Family Connection

Pentecost is sometimes called the birthday of the Church. The Gospel for Pentecost reminds us that the Church begins with the command to forgive. Within the family, the domestic church, we learn how to forgive and how to accept forgiveness. The gift of the Holy Spirit enables us to do both. Today is a fitting time to share a family celebration of reconciliation. As you gather together as a family, sit quietly for a few minutes, inviting everyone to reflect upon their need to forgive and to receive forgiveness. If there is a situation or issue within the family that needs attention, spend some time reflecting on how your family might address it.

Read together today's Gospel, John 20:19-23. Talk together about how Jesus gave us the gift of the Holy Spirit to help us in the work of forgiveness and to bring us peace.

Pray together today's psalm or the Prayer to the Holy Spirit, asking that the Holy Spirit help your family. Share with one another the Sign of Peace.





Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture


When I was twenty-two years of age in August of 2000, I experienced World Youth Day in Rome. As for many of my generation, the event was life-changing for me. Surrounded by joyful, hope-filled young people from seemingly every nation and tongue, we were gathered around the Pope, sharing a common Faith and love. The Pope spoke to us of our shared family bond in the Church and invited us to give our lives in service to others. Now twenty-four years later, my life as a priest, like that of so many others from those special days, continues on that same path of love and unity — despite my many weaknesses. What makes that continuation possible?

This week's feast gives the answer: the Holy Spirit. The gift of God — His very life — the third person of the Trinity, is the Spirit who animates the entire Church and each member of it. He makes us one-in-love in a way that utterly exceeds human capacity. For example, he makes the apostles speak with tongues of fire, and everyone hears them in his own native tongue. The Holy Spirit is the means by which Jesus establishes a new family, one that crosses all possible boundaries of time, space, and culture. The Holy Spirit never tires in enthusing us for mission.

Aren't we longing to experience the Holy Spirit in a fresh way? Today we celebrate this untiring flame, once ignited on earth and burning still. So, we humbly cry out: Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful, and enkindle in us the fire of your love!

Happy Birthday, Church! Happy Feast Day, Newman Center-Holy Spirit Parish!!

There is much to celebrate today!!! In a very special way, we celebrate the church's birthday today on this great Solemnity of Pentecost. Although we have come to the end of the Easter season, a greater task is given to us, through the power and the gifts of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit descends upon the apostles as "tongues of fire which parted and came to rest on each of them." (Acts 2:3). In last week's Gospel, Jesus leaves a simple and specific task to the apostles, and then leaves and ascends to heaven. This left the apostles confused and afraid. How were they to continue what Jesus had asked them to do if He was not there? And to leave them alone, again?! The experience in the upper room with the Holy Spirit was the reassurance they needed to go out into the world. Thus, the beginning of the Church. Jesus sends the Holy Spirit because He loved us and didn't want to leave us to feel alone and afraid. As we recall the gift of the Holy Spirit at our own Baptism and Confirmation, let us continue to be witnesses of faith, hope, and love to one another. Let us celebrate the empowerment of the Holy Spirit each and every day of our lives and reignite that fire

that was given to us so we can truly go out into the world and tell the Good News!

Which gift of the Holy Spirit would you choose? Theresa Civantos Barber - published on 05/28/23

God works powerfully in the world today, as he always has, but sometimes it's hard to see how he is moving in our lives. We can hear his voice and see him at work through circumstances and events outside ourselves, through reading Sacred Scripture, growing in faith with other spiritual books, and through listening to the words of wise people. But most of all, we can hear his voice directly in our hearts. This feast of Pentecost is a reminder that the Holy Spirit's work did not end on that sacred, long-ago day.

When the Holy Spirit descended on the apostles in the upper room, they were strengthened with courage to witness publicly to Christ. That's why Brother Silas Henderson, SDS, writes: Pentecost is a celebration of possibilities, both for individual believers and for the Church. The Pentecost of the first Christians was a witnessing of the power of the Spirit for the future.

We are living in that future, and the power of the Spirit surrounds us. The holy feast of Pentecost reminds me that his fire is still burning, still kindling Christ's eternal light in my soul. I just need to pay attention to how. I was talking about all this with my kids as we approached this feast. I shared with them that the Holy Spirit brings seven gifts (listed here traditionally and as they are translated in the Rite of Confirmation):

Wisdom, Understanding, Counsel (Right judgment), Fortitude (Courage), Knowledge (Reverence), Piety, Fear of God (Wonder and awe)

We had a brief chat about what each of these gifts mean, and then we talked about which gift of the Spirit we would ask him to give us. Two of my kids wanted strength. One wanted understanding. I wanted wisdom, and offered a heartfelt prayer right then and there that God would give me a little of this gift that feels so elusive.

Later I reflected on how wonderful it is that we don't actually have to pick just one gift. We can receive all of them, asking God to give us the gift that we need at that time, knowing that what we need will change from moment to moment.

Which gift of the Spirit do you need today, in this time and place of your life? How will you ask the Holy Spirit to move in your soul and in your life on this, his holy feast?
