### From the Desk of the Pastor

You could buy a meal for a person who is hungry or for a person who just ate a feast. You could spend time with a lonely person or with someone who has more friends than you. You could step forward to join a parish committee that your experience and knowledge can help, or you can join a ministry where you will constantly struggle to figure out what to do. All of the above actions involve you giving and sharing yourself and your gifts. But not all of these actions will bear good fruit.

If a sower sows seeds only on rocky or weed-infested soil, nothing of great value will grow. But if that same sower plants his seeds in rich soil, then the harvest will one day be great. In all of the soils, the seed is being sown, but it is not the act of sowing that is the most important factor.

In living a stewardship way of life, we must discern how best to share our gifts. Discernment needs the Holy Spirit and a desire to follow God's will, not our own. Our own desires and misconceptions can cause us to use our gifts unwisely. The more mindful we are of how, when, and why we are sharing ourselves, than the greater the impact for God's glory. God wants all of you, but not in a way that is without understanding and discernment. He wants you to shine as a light to the world through your stewardship just as He came to you as the Light of the World in baptism.

### Family Connection

Church documents call the Christian family the "domestic church." This is both a compliment and a call to commitment. Because the family is a community formed in love and dedicated to the physical and spiritual growth of its members, it is a miniature version of the Kingdom of God on earth. This Sunday's Gospel Reading, Mark 4:26-34, consists of two parables that Jesus used to help us discern the mystery of the Kingdom of God. The beginning of the kingdom is compared to a tiny seed that over time matures and ripens. Many of the things we do within the family seem insignificant. They are part of our daily activity and attract little attention. Yet they show our love and concern for one another. According to the Gospel, it's these small things that yield big results, acting as significant contributions to the growth of God's kingdom on earth. The growth of the seed illustrates the nature and the results of a strong faith.

Read aloud together the Gospel of Mark 4:26–34. Consider how your family's concerns reflect the Church's concerns for those members who are poor, forgotten, hungry, ill, shunned, or lonely. Together think of a specific action that you can do to assist a person in your extended family, neighborhood, or parish. Now pray together the Lord's Prayer, pausing briefly to consider the import of the words "thy kingdom come." Each evening this week as you gather for supper, share with one another the simple acts of love you witnessed within the family that day.

A mustard seed is already enough to conquer doubt Joseph Pearce - published on 01/15/24

The very existence of one solitary mustard seed is a mystery beyond the ken of the human mind. If it can remove doubts, why couldn't it move mountains?

We are blessed with silence. More importantly, we are blessed by silence.

In his book, The Power of Silence: Against the Dictatorship of Noise, Cardinal Robert Sarah offers us the following words of whispered wisdom: "Through silence, we return to our heavenly origin, where there is nothing but calm, peace, repose, silent contemplation, and adoration of the radiant face of God."

With these words in mind, I realize how blessed I am by the silence in my life. My office looks out over a meadow and a creek and the woods beyond. My desk is set up by the window so that every time I raise my eyes from my work, I can look out at the silent beauty of the landscape. Such silence invites us to the contemplation of the radiant face of creation, seeing in it the radiant face of the Creator.

Thinking of the words of the Gospel in which Christ admonishes us that faith the size of a mustard seed can move mountains, I am reminded that a fact the size of a mustard seed can remove mountains of doubt.

The very existence of one solitary mustard seed is a mystery beyond the ken of the human mind. How did anything come into being? The speck of dust is a thing, something. How did this something come into being? But this mystery is nothing compared to the existence of a mind that can perceive the existence of the thing. What is a mind? Who am I? How can I perceive the mustard seed? How can I think about it?

And then there is the existence of other minds with whom I can share my thoughts about the mustard seed. And those minds can communicate their thoughts to me. They enable my mind to understand how others perceive the mustard seed. They enable my mind to be ennobled by theirs.

The existence of one single mustard seed and of minds capable of perceiving it and communicating that perception to others are enough to lead the contemplative mind and soul to a knowledge of God's existence and to the adoration of his radiant face. Why should I doubt that faith the size of a mustard seed can move mountains when I know that reason in the presence of a mustard seed can remove the mountains of doubt?
