

From the Desk of the Pastor

"Our eyes are fixed on the Lord, pleading for his mercy."

Our readings today remind us that, even in our weakest and toughest moments, God has a plan. In our Second Reading, St. Paul describes a "thorn" that had been given to him. He believed this thorn to be the thing that kept him grounded as he said, "to beat me, to keep me from being too elated."

At first, he asked the Lord to remove this cross, but the Lord replied, "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness." Through this explanation, St. Paul resolved to believe, "I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions and constraints, for the sake of Christ; for when I am weak, then I am strong."

We all bear crosses in this life, whether they seem to be little thorns or sharp daggers. The easiest thing to do, as St. Paul did, is to pray for the cross to be taken. It would be great if all of our struggles just magically faded away! But listen to the Lord's words, "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness."


Stop and reflect on your cross. Instead of wishing it to go away, look at it as an opportunity to grow and to allow God to work in your life. God permitted this cross in your life for a reason. Do not let the opportunity for Christ to work on your heart pass you by.

Today, recall that God loves us more than we could ever imagine. There is not a moment that goes by that He does not have us in mind. He has a specific plan for our lives. Therefore, may we encounter life's challenges with confidence in Christ.



Family Connection

Our family plays an important role in shaping us and forming our self-identity. In family life, we find a safe place to discover who we are and who God calls us to be. But sometimes the influences from outside our family can make us unrecognizable to those who know us best. These outside influences can lead us away from God, or they can lead us toward a deeper relationship with God. In today's Gospel, we see that the people of Nazareth could not recognize Jesus as the Son of God. They could know him only as the son of Mary. We hope that through our family life we will be encouraged to filter the many influences on our lives through the lens of faith so that we will become the person that God calls us to be. As you gather as a family, talk about the people and events that are influencing members of your family. Acknowledge that many of these people and events are positive influences, helping us be better people and leading us to a deeper relationship with God. Also acknowledge, however, that there are negative influences in our lives that risk pulling us away from God. Observe that Jesus was a person who allowed his relationship with God to be the most important thing in his life. This led many people to have faith in him as the Son of God. However, not everyone could recognize this about Jesus. Read today's Gospel, Mark 6:1 -6. Ask: Who does not recognize Jesus as God's Son in this Gospel? (some of his kinfolk in Nazareth) Observe that because of the people's lack of faith, Jesus could not perform many miracles in Nazareth. Conclude by praying together that our families will continue to help us follow God in our lives. Pray together the Prayer for Vocations.

Persevering when the goal seems very far away

Perseverance is more than just sticking it out; it's about having faith. Yes, we must stick with our efforts, while still keeping in mind God's own timing.

Life often feels like the proverbial long and winding road -especially when our goals seem far away and our efforts
fruitless. No matter what we're trying to achieve (be it getting in
shape, saving for a dream, or launching a project), the journey
will always be challenging and full of setbacks. That's why
keeping perseverance and the lessons it teaches us in sight is
fundamental.

The Bible constantly shows the power of being steadfast. Just think about Moses' journey out of Egypt. According to biblical narrative, he spent 40 years wandering through the desert, sustained by God's promise of a land flowing with milk and honey. Like Moses' own, our goals may seem far off -- but it's our faith and perseverance that will guide us through the desert of our doubts and difficulties.

Growing during tough times

St. John of the Cross, the great Iberian mystic and Doctor of the Church, wrote extensively on the dark night of the soul -- a period of stark spiritual desolation. Although his texts address this night in fundamentally mystic terms, they also speak to our everyday struggles. We all experience times when our efforts seem futile and our prayers go unanswered. But it's in these dark times that our faith grows stronger. We learn to fly blind, trusting the instruments we have at hand: faith, hope, grace. In his Letter to the Romans, Paul speaks of perseverance and endurance: "we [...] boast in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope" (Romans 5:3-4). Our struggles are not in vain. They help us grow, build our character, and make us even more hopeful. Nobody sees the fruits of labor right away. As a farmer, we plant the seeds, water them, and then wait patiently for the harvest.

In short, we have to trust the process, especially when we can't see immediate results.

Perseverance is more than just sticking it out; it's about having faith. Sure, we have to make sure to stick with our efforts -- but keeping in mind God's own timing. No matter how long the road ahead may be or how dark the night, the sun will always rise. As we look back on it all, we'll see that every step we took was necessary -- and worth it.

Aloha from Manoa!

Twenty-five years ago, cancer unexpectedly changed my life and the lives around me. I felt every bit of human weakness known to man — stress, sadness, anxiety, worry, helplessness, frustration, depression, loneliness, guilt, overwhelmed, and most especially anger. I was so angry with God. I constantly asked Him, "Why me?" I was doing everything He asked of me — I was a good and obedient daughter, I was a loving sister, I was a caring person to my family, I was a great friend, and an all—around kind-hearted person. I began to falter in faith. I was so enraged with God. Why would you do this to me and my family? I didn't deserve this.

We often question ourselves, "Why me?" In a weird and bizarre way, I like to think of God's response as this: "Why not?" This doesn't mean that God imposes bad and evil in our lives or that He enjoys testing us on a daily basis. Our lives are His and He is ours. God never gives up on us, so let's not give up on Him. When we face weakness and hardship, God is our strength in these challenges. It has taken me a very long time to come to terms with this. It has not been an easy journey. Ironically, cancer has shown me that there is hope. It has made me stronger each day and has opened my eyes to see and experience life from a different lens. For those who are currently experiencing cancer, for those who have lost their lives because of cancer, and for those warriors that are still here – I continue my efforts in the fight against this horrid disease. My life is dedicated to you. May we be reminded of God's unconditional love for us. He is our strength and healer. Let us put our trust in God so to guide us and help us in sharing and speaking His truth of faith, hope, and love.

Bill has been a spiritual director for over 40 years and holds a Doctorate in Ministry with a specialty in clinical pastoral counseling and spiritual direction from Andover Newton Theological School and Weston Jesuit School of Theology. Currently, he is the Rector of St. Mary's University and had served as the Provincial Assistant for Religious Life of the Marianist Province of the United States. Fr. Bill was previously member of the faculty at Oblate School of Theology and director of the Ministry to Ministers Sabbatical Program.
