

From the Desk of the Pastor

"Lord, let us see your kindness, and grant us your salvation."

Our readings today remind us to live our lives in total surrender to God's care.

The Gospel recounts when Jesus instructs His twelve apostles to begin their missionary work two by two. He encouraged them to take very little — a walking stick and sandals.

If you can recall a time you packed for a trip, or even left the house for a day's travel, you might remember making a list or packing days in advance. We tend to pack so we know we will be comfortable.

If we extend this concept of "comfort" into other areas of our lives, we will most likely find a few instances where we ensure life is comfortable. It could be buying extra food at the grocery store, making sure we have the most updated technology, or even feeling safe in our bank accounts. It is not bad to have extra food in the pantry or a new phone. And it isn't bad to save money. These things can be good when used properly.

But what if we are looking to these things for comfort, security or even happiness?

Imagine if Jesus approached you and said, "Go out and do my work, but you can only bring a walking stick and shoes." Would you be willing to surrender all the rest?

A key component of living out our call as Christian stewards is total surrender. It is trusting in God during our best moments and our hardest. It is looking to Him for security, comfort and happiness. Reflect on the ways you might be looking for comfort in the things of this world. Tangibly find a way to become independent from that "thing" so that you can become more dependent on God.

Family Connection

Families who work together to accomplish routine household tasks know that the benefits are more than efficiency. In sharing daily tasks, we accomplish more, but we also build relationships that last—and it's a lot more fun! Jesus sent his disciples in pairs to minister in his name. Perhaps the job was accomplished more effectively this way, but more importantly, Jesus' mission was accomplished more authentically. The Christian message can only authentically be proclaimed in and through the community of faith. In our work with others, we build this community of faith and can invite others to share in it. As you gather as a family, talk about some household tasks that are more easily accomplished when two or more people work together. Talk about how working together not only makes the job easier, but also makes the task more fun because we are able to spend time together. Read together today's Gospel, Mark 6:7-13. Ask: Why do you think Jesus sent out his disciples in pairs? Observe that Jesus continues to give us a community with which we share our life of discipleshipour family and the community of the Church. Conclude in prayer together that we will continue to rely on the support of the community of the Church in our life of discipleship. Pray together the Prayer to the Holy Spirit.

Choosing words with prudence and charity Daniel Esparza - published on 07/05/24

By carefully choosing when to speak and when to remain silent, we can foster more loving and peaceful relationships.

As we strive for honesty, transparency, and sincerity, the virtue of silence is easily overlooked. We often feel compelled to express every thought and opinion (whether online or not), believing that withholding our words is at odds with being truthful. There are times, however, when silence is not only polite or kind, but also prudent, charitable, and the right thing to do. As the old saying goes, "the greater part of conversation should consist of listening." Measured speech is indeed rare — and valuable.

One of the most challenging situations in which we struggle with silence is during arguments. It is tempting to call each other names or insist on proving our point. But Proverbs 15:1 reminds us that "a soft answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger." In these heated moments, silence can serve as a powerful tool to de-escalate tension —and demonstrate love and respect for the other person. By choosing not to retaliate with harsh words, we "turn the other cheek" (Matthew 5:39).

Silent saints

Moreover, the practice of silence can be a form of charity. St. Therese of Lisieux, the Little Flower, emphasized the importance of small acts of kindness. She famously wrote that "without love, deeds, even the most brilliant, count for nothing."

Sometimes the most charitable act we can perform is to refrain from speaking words that might harm or discourage others. In doing so, we exercise self-control and humility, recognizing that our silence may be more loving than our words.

In discussions where we may be right, silence can also be a virtue. "There never was an angry man who thought his anger was unjust," St. Francis de Sales once wrote. Often the desire to be right comes from pride. By choosing silence, we demonstrate a willingness to put harmony and peace ahead of personal vindication. This does not mean that we should never speak the truth, but rather that we should discern the right time and manner to do so, ensuring that our words build up rather than tear down.

In everyday interactions, silence can prevent misunderstandings and encourage thoughtful communication. James 1:19 wisely advises, "let everyone be quick to listen, slow to speak, and slow to be offended." In short: Listening more and speaking less allows us to respond with greater empathy and understanding.

Silence is a powerful virtue consistent with the principles of prudence, charity, and love. By carefully choosing when to speak and when to remain silent, we can foster more loving and peaceful relationships. Let us strive to emulate the wisdom of the saints and Scripture and embrace silence as a gift that enriches our lives and the lives of those around us.

Aloha from Hilo!

I am blessed to be here again for Ho'oulu Me Ka Ikaika (Grow with Strength), a four-day retreat/camp, as a counselor-team leader and fellow childhood cancer survivor. Established in 1992 by the American Cancer Society, Ho'oulu Me Ka Ikaika is a four-day retreat/camp experience for teens and young adults who have had childhood cancer and/or currently going through treatment for cancer. The retreat/camp is led by a team of volunteer oncology pediatric-adolescent doctors, nurses, and medical professionals, along with former childhood-teen cancer survivors. This fun-filled, unique experience gives way for them to connect with peers and process the cancer experience in a safe, nonjudgmental, and supporting community. The retreat atmosphere is one of healing as well as growing with strength and confidence into an adult cancer survivor. As of 2023, Ho'oulu Me Ka Ikaika continues its mission in Hilo, Hawai'i as an independent non-profit. The theme for this year's camp is ikigai. It is a Japanese term that blends two words: "iki" meaning "to live," and "gai" meaning "reason," which translates to "a reason to live." This concept encourages people to discover what truly matters to them and to live a life filled with purpose and joy. What is your purpose in the life that God has given you? Do you find joy in your jobs/roles, tasks, and other daily things you do? What mission do you feel God is calling to you? How are we living out that call? The readings this weekend focus on God's call and mission. He calls us to serve Him and trust in His guidance. As we respond to God's call, we grow in faith and love. Let us pray for the grace to hear His call and the courage to respond. May we trust in God's care and preach His message of repentance and love.
